A Word About the Service

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the forty-day season of Lent, a time of meditation, reflection and repentance for devout Christians. Throughout the history of God's people, ashes have signified repentance and the practice of putting ashes on one's body is a public display of a penitent heart is as ancient as the Old Testament itself. In the Christian tradition, the ashes come from the palms of the previous year that were used in the processional of Palm Sunday. Symbolically, the use of these ashes points to the suffering of Jesus and the practice of putting ashes on the forehead began as a way to "mark" those who were willing to undertake the journey to the cross and suffer with Jesus.

Once a practice only observed by the Catholic Church, in recent years Protestants have also come to value this symbolic act as a way to prepare themselves for the devotion of the Lenten season. Just as our journey toward salvation begins when we recognize our sinfulness and are willing to make our confession, so the journey of Lent begins when we cultivate within us a penitent heart that is eager to move beyond our Sin. Thus, receiving the ashes in this observance marks us as disciples who desire to journey with Jesus to the cross, to endure the suffering and sacrifice of Christ in order that we may be raised with him to new life at Easter.

You are invited to share in this service as the first step in your Lenten journey. Yet, while the service is beneficial in and of itself, the full meaning of it will only be realized at the end of the journey: at the cross and empty tomb. Therefore, the invitation extends beyond merely sharing in this service of the ashes: you are invited to a time of daily devotion, of worship and meditation during the forty days of Lent and, ultimately, to share in the resurrection of Easter day. We pray God's richest blessings on you this day as you begin this journey.
